







From the Chairman's Desk

Indian Institute of Management Lucknow (IIM Lucknow), established in 1984, celebrated its 40th year of foundation on 27th July this year. Over the past 40 years, it has established itself as the premier business school not only in India, but in the world.

The Institute offers seven programs namely, (i) Post Graduate Program in Management (PGP), (ii) Post Graduate Program in Agribusiness Management (PGP ABM), (iii) Post Graduate Program in Sustainable Management (PGP SM), (iv) Post Graduate Program in Management for Working Executives (PGP-WE), (v) International Program in Management for Executives (IPMX), (vi) Fellow Program in Management (FPM) and (vii) Executive Fellow Program in Management (EFPM).

Over the past decade, the institute has made significant progress across all dimensions.

The total number of students graduating from all programs has increased to around 850 students in 2023-24. The intake of female students increased to around 240 students, and female students represent 29% of all students in IIM Lucknow.

IIM Lucknow has tied-up with global schools including with John Hopkins University USA, Leeds University Business School UK, FAU School of Business Germany, ESSEC Business School France, UIR-Rabat Business School Morocco, Emlyon Business School (Initiated a double degree program) and EDHEC Business School France (initiated a joint degree program).

The institute has also opened two new centres - the Centre for Public Policy and the Rekhi Centre of Excellence for the Science of Happiness.

IIM Lucknow is a thought leader in management. The research papers published by the faculty grew to 142 publications in 2023-24. Almost one third of these publications were in high-impact journals including Australian Business Deans Council's (ABDC), A, A* and FT50 journals.

IIM Lucknow has also established an incubator - IIM L Enterprise Incubation Centre. The Centre is supported by Government of India, Government of Uttar Pradesh along with Startup India. It is focussed on creating an ecosystem that fosters and supports innovation and knowledge-based entrepreneurship. The incubator has funded 72 start-ups till date. Additionally, as a joint initiative with SIDBI, IIM Lucknow has also launched the SIDBI Centre for Innovations in Financial Inclusion (SCIFI) that supports startups working on financial inclusion. SCIFI has supported 17 start-ups till date.

IIM Lucknow has maintained its leadership as a leading global institute which is reflected in global rankings by various agencies. It is a double crown accredited institute by both AMBA (Association of MBAs, an organization based in London, United Kingdom that certifies the quality of an MBA program) and AACSB (Association to Advance Collegiate Schools of Business, an organization based in Tampa, Florida, USA that is a global accrediting body for business schools). It is ranked #6 in the NIRF (National Institutional Ranking Framework)

amongst all management institutes in India and #72 in the Financial Times Masters in Management Ranking 2023. IIM Lucknow's PGP featured in the #111-120 by the QS Rankings of global management institutes in 2024.

The increase in student intake has been enabled by an expansion and upgradation of physical and digital infrastructure. New hostels buildings were inaugurated for both PGP and FPM students, new state of the art classroom block - Bodhigriha - III was built with advanced audio-visual equipment and high-quality projectors for enabling hybrid learning environments and new faculty office was built for faculty members. All the classrooms, student and faculty facilities have been upgraded with modern infrastructure including high-speed digital network, air conditioning in the mess, renovation of residential buildings, faculty lounge and Management Development Program (MDP) guest house. Special emphasis has been placed on sports and recreation activities including construction of a new pavilion for Cricket Stadium, a new Kabaddi Ground and upgradation of the Basketball court. The institute has focused on sustainability with green buildings and solar power-driven energy supply for its facilities.

The institute continues to make strides across all facets of management education and is well respected for its academic excellence and leadership development.

I would like to thank the Director of the institute, my colleagues in the board, the faculty members, the non-teaching staff and all the students for their dedication and support to the institute. IIML now has a vibrant community that values curiosity, collaboration, leadership and excellence.

Director's Overview



At IIM Lucknow, we are all about driving excellence, sparking innovation, and nurturing leadership in management education. We're committed to top-notch academics and making sure our students are ready to tackle real-world challenges. Our focus is on capacity building, ethical practices and giving back to society, with a strong emphasis on sustainability, corporate social responsibility, and intrapreneurial mindset. It is my pleasure to present the highlights of the year 2023–24 and our achievements in these domains.

PROGRAMS

In the current academic year, our students have continued to bring honour and distinction to IIM Lucknow. A total of 89 students benefited from need-based scholarships. Some notable industry scholarships include the IDFC First Bank scholarship received by Mohammad Yasir, Sidharth, and Utkarsh Tripathi. Harsh Mishra and Manasi Parakh were awarded the Aditya Birla Scholarship; Ashutosh Mishra was selected as an OPJEMS Scholar, and Utkarsh Agrawal and Sohini Sau were named Apeejay Scholars. Parekh Sidharth secured the Class of 1993 scholarship award, and Chandni was honoured with the Amritkala Dayal Scholarship for

Girl Students. Abhishek Mittal, Deeksha Khatwani, Bismita Sahoo, Anant Kumar Agrawal, and Vibha Kapoor, received the Central Bank of India scholarship.

In the realm of research, our FPM scholars have won many awards in conferences. Best Paper Award was presented to Anshul Aggarwal for the Management Doctoral Colloquium-2022 at IIT Kharagpur, Nishant Garg for the Academy for Global Business Advancement-2023 Conference in Dubai, Deepali Dhingra for the INDAM Conference-2024 at Goa Institute of Management, Vivek Mishra for the Annual Research Conference-2021 at IIM Lucknow, and Mohit Ray for the POMS India International Conference-2022 at IIM Kozhikode.

Our students have also done well in extracurricular activities, notably achieving significant victories in Sangharsh, the annual inter-IIM sports event. A dedicated contingent of over 230 students showcased exceptional talent and competitive spirit. Socially, the student cell Abivyakti led a compelling social media campaign and performed 'Nukkad Natak' to raise awareness about mental health and transgender issues, accumulating over 22,000 views. The Bhavishya Social Initiatives Committee, in partnership with the Blood Bank, KGMU Lucknow, successfully organized a voluntary blood donation camp, reflecting our community's commitment to social responsibility and altruism.

The institute hosted industry stalwarts in lectures, talks, and panel discussions, like Shri Rajendra Singh, renowned as the Waterman of India; Dr Augusto Lopez Claros, International Economist, Ex IMF Global Governance Forum, USA; Dr Arthur Lyon Dhal, President International Environment Forum, USA among others.

We have strengthened our strategic partnerships with reputed business schools internationally for academic collaborations and student immersion programs. This year 111 students participated in the Student Exchange Program with 78 IIML students visiting our partner institutes and 33 foreign students visiting IIML.

In placements too, despite the global slowdown, we secured 634 offers for 537 students with more than 200 legacy and new recruiters offering diverse profiles across sectors.

EXECUTIVE EDUCATION

In line with our commitment to capacity building, IIM Lucknow introduced a suite of advanced programs for CXOs and senior leaders, designed to impart critical expertise and industry insights for high-level roles. Our expanded portfolio of Blended Online MDPs featured specialized leadership tracks, along with courses in general management and functional expertise, including advanced training in HR analytics, digital marketing, and artificial intelligence.

Endorsed by industry leaders, these programs attracted participants from across India and globally. The year saw a 42% increase in the number of professionals who upskilled through these programs, solidifying our unwavering focus on cuttingedge education and fostering professional growth across diverse management disciplines.

ACCREDITATION AND RANKINGS

IIM Lucknow continues to solidify its reputation as a leading institution in management education, as reflected in its impressive rankings across various national and global platforms. Consistently ranked among the top business schools in India, IIML has garnered recognition for its exceptional academic programs, research excellence, and robust industry connections.

In the Financial Times Rankings for Global Masters in Management, our flagship PGP ranked 72nd and the IPMX program ranked 85th in the Global Masters of Business Administration category. In world QS rankings, PGP featured in the 111-120 category and IPMX in 151-200.

In the NIRF 2023 rankings, IIM Lucknow has retained its 6th rank. We are a double crown accredited institute by AMBA and AACSB and have secured positive eligibility decision by EFMD in 2023 and look forward to the EQUIS accreditation review in mid-2025.

FACULTY RESEARCH AND CONSULTANCY

Faculty has been the intellectual resource of the institution. The year saw 156 publications in national and international high-impact journals with more than 31% publications in A & A* category and four publications in the FT50 category journals. A noteworthy improvement in both quantity and quality of publications.

There was also an increased impetus on national and international conferences with faculty and PhD scholars presenting papers in more than 100 conferences nationally and globally, like Academy of Management, Indian Academy of Management and others.

Two Post-doctoral scholars joined the institute: Dr. Nakagawa Kozi in the Centre for Public Policy and Dr. Karishma Trivedi in the Rekhi Centre of Excellence for Science of Happiness.

IIM Lucknow hosted the 3rd Annual International Research Conference, which featured presenters from across the globe, two doctoral workshops, and many keynote addresses from renowned academicians. This conference provided a platform for scholars to share their insights and foster collaboration and innovation in management research.

Four of our faculty members, Prof. Samir K Srivastava, Prof. Chandan Sharma, Prof. Suresh K. Jakhar, and Prof. Sanjay K. Singh were included in the science-wide author databases of

standardized citation indicators as top 2% researchers in the world as per a study conducted by Stanford University and published by Elsevier in October 2023. This marks the third consecutive year that IIM Lucknow professors have achieved this recognition for their exceptional contributions to the world of academia.

Prof. Shubhda Arora's Co-edited book, "Media Narratives and the COVID-19 Pandemic: An Asian Perspective" was published by Routledge India in July 2023. It investigates mediated lives and media narratives during the COVID-19 pandemic, with Asia as a focus point.

Prof. Arunabha Mukhopadhyay continued his work on the 3-year research project funded by the Ministry of Electronics and Information Technology to set up cyber security labs with the purpose of conducting cyber risk assessment, quantification and mitigation.

During the academic year, a range of consultancy projects were completed by various faculty members. To cite a few, Prof. Kshitij Awasthi, Prof. Dipti Gupta, and Prof. Priyanka Sharma conducted a study on Arth Ganga: the sustainable economic development of the Ganga Basin for the National Mission for Clean Ganga (NMCG). Prof. Sanjeev Kapoor and Prof. Seshadev Sahoo assessed the U.P. State Sugar Corporation Ltd. and its subsidiaries. Prof. Prakash Singh and Prof. Payal Mehra studied industrial performance in Uttar Pradesh for the Institute of Chartered Accountants of India. Prof. Kushankur Dey analyzed the regulatory landscape of equity versus commodity derivatives for Multi Commodity Exchange, and together with Prof. Sanjeev Kapoor, assessed milk federation marketing strategies for The World Bank. The U.P. Sugar Mills Association engaged Prof. Sanjeev Kapoor for insights on enhancing the sugar industry's role. Additionally, Prof. S.B. Dash and Prof. Priyanka Sharma examined the marketing and branding of Uttar Pradesh tourist destinations, while Prof. Priyanka Sharma and Prof. Anjali Bansal worked on restructuring the U.P. Tourism Department.

ALUMNI

Our alumni have ascended to prominent roles in the industry. Their success stories reinforce the value of our education and bring enduring recognition to the Institute. Kamlesh Varshney (1989), an IRS officer and Finance Minister Awardee, has been appointed to the Board of SEBI. IIML is now the only institute with two SEBI board members. Sudeep Kolte (1996) was appointed as Managing Director for Saint-Gobain India Pvt Ltd Gyproc business. Vikas Gupta (1998) took over as CEO and MD of VLCC, a beauty and weight management services firm. Munish Sharda (1997) was appointed as Executive Director and Full-Time Director of Axis Bank. Vandita Pant (1992) took over as the Chief Financial Officer of BHP. Vikram Gopalakrishnan (1992) took over as Managing Director of Union Bancaire Privée Bank, Switzerland.

On the Entrepreneurial front too, IIML alumni continue to go from strength to strength, with many alumni founded companies seeing large growth, expansion, and fund-raising



during the year like Supertails, DarwinBox, XpressBees, Rebel Foods, Incedo, Fintellix, and Lodestar. Amitava Saha (2001) raised \$80 Million for his logistics unicorn XPressBees, taking his firm's valuation to over \$1.47 Billion

I am most delighted to share an important alumni initiative of establishment of the Radhakrishnan Gopalan Young Faculty Researcher Endowment. It is a tribute by the Batch of 1996 to commemorate their batchmate Late Prof. Radhakrishnan Gopalan. With an initial corpus of approximately 75 lakhs and an annual award of 7 Lakhs, this award aims to recognize and encourage young faculty researchers at IIM Lucknow. The first recipient of the coveted award is Professor Suresh Jhakar from the Operations Management group.

CENTERS OF EXCELLENCE

Centre for Public Policy

Niti Aayog in collaboration with Government of Uttar Pradesh appointed IIM Lucknow as the 'Lead Knowledge Institute' to conduct studies, stakeholder consultations, workshops and conferences for strengthening functioning of planning department of Uttar Pradesh. Focusing on MSMEs this year, we hosted a roundtable on the role of E-commerce for the growth of MSMEs in partnership with Flipkart. Mr. Pankaj Chaudhary, Minister of state for Finance, Government of India, presided over as the Chief Guest and the event was attended by many top policymakers, industry representatives and academicians. We signed an MoU with Suzuki India Foundation for the conduct of study pertaining to increasing competitiveness of MSMEs by understanding the challenges they face. The centre also organized a training program for policymakers to accelerate the Just Transition for MSMEs in partnership with United Nations Development Program (UNDP) and School of Public Governance.

We partnered with School for Public Governance for the Net Zero Fellowship where selected fellows were provided training on policy aspects of climate-change related challenges. We partnered with Grameen India Foundation for the North Zone hackathon event on financial inclusion and collaborated with CM Urban Fellowship Program related to 100 aspirational

Urban Local Bodies plan of Government of Uttar Pradesh called Akanshiya Nagar Yojna.

IIM Lucknow completed the mentoring for the largest cohort under the Mahatma Gandhi National fellowship (MGNF) program that was being run in collaboration with the Ministry of Skill Development and Entrepreneurship. 105 MGNF fellows representing districts from Uttar Pradesh, Assam, Himachal Pradesh and Mizoram were awarded the certificate in Public Policy and Management in the valedictory ceremony.

Our focus on education and health continued. We conducted capacity building program, in several batches, for over 150 Principals of Government Inter Colleges of Uttar Pradesh in partnership with Secondary Education Department of Government of Uttar Pradesh. We also conducted a specifically designed program for Principals of ITIs. We collaborated with Johns Hopkins University and UP Government for capacity building and handholding plan for Chief Medical Officers of Uttar Pradesh. IIM Lucknow was the "Process and Evaluation / Jury Partner" for the 9th CSR Impact Awards, 2023. This is the flagship event that seeks to encourage companies, CSR foundations, and CSR implementing partners to deliver high impact through CSR projects.

Centre for Business Sustainability

The Centre for Business Sustainability hosted its third edition of Sanrakshan, the annual business sustainability conclave. The event attracted renowned industry doyens, delegates, and dignitaries, who shared their hands-on experience and insights on sustainability in business. The Chief Guest for the event was, Mr. Ashish Tiwari, Honourable Secretary, Department of Environment, Forest & Climate Change-Government of Uttar Pradesh. The event witnessed panel discussions and keynotes by Chief Sustainability Officers and MDs of major corporates like BCG, Accenture, Microsoft, WRI India, KPMG India, Brillio, L'Oréal, Reckitt and policy making bodies like GIZ, and thinktank like UNDP India, WRI, among others.

The Centre also spearheaded the, first of its kind, detailed environment sustainability report prepared by The Energy and Resources Institute (TERI) with a focus on measurement of carbon footprint. The maiden endeavor towards a



comprehensive ecological footprint assessment will aid in envisioning the institute's path in alignment with Sustainable Development Goals and a Net Zero future.

Centre for Marketing in Emerging Economies

CMEE completed the research study sponsored by Department of Tourism, Government of Uttar Pradesh on 'Tourist's perception of selected destinations in UP'. The centre was also a co-organizing partner for the 'Future Crime Summit', an international consortium, organized by CMEE's Corporate Member: Future Crime Research Foundation (FCRF), that focused upon the emerging concerns and solutions in the cyber security domain.

Rekhi Centre of Excellence for Science of Happiness

The centre conducted various Happiness Workshops for PGP Sustainable Management Students as well as in UGC-HRDC-University of Allahabad's Refresher Course in Psychology. Post-Doctoral Fellow Dr. Karishma Trivedi, who recently joined the centre, has started working towards setting up Mind Lab and other projects on Happiness and wellbeing.

IIM LUCKNOW INCUBATORS

IIML Enterprise Incubation Centre (EIC) conducted a total of 09 national startup pitches and onboarded a total of 41 Startups during this year in the areas of Deeptech, Agritech, Fintech, Ed tech, Social Media, Healthtech, E- Commerce, and Cyber Security and signed multiple strategic MoUs with various Institutes of Eminence, PSUs and Statutory Bodies like Oil India Limited, International Financial Services Centres Authority (IFSCA), National Institute of Entrepreneurship and Small Business Development (NIESBUD), Balmer Lawrie & Co. Ltd among others.

The Centre launched an exclusive Corporate VC Startup Engagement Program (CSEP) in collaboration with Oil India Limited, a Maharatna PSU. This unique program brings together

a Public Sector Enterprise by Govt of India and an Innovation Ecosystem Expert IIML EIC to support and promote Startups in India.

The Centre also launched an exclusive Agritech Accelerator Program in collaboration with National Bank for Agriculture and Rural Development (NABARD) receiving 200+ applications and onboarding 9 startups in the domain of Agriculture and Sustainability.

EIC launched an exclusive Corporate VC Startup Engagement Programme (CSEP) in collaboration with Balmer Lawrie & Co Limited, a Miniratna – I, a Public Sector Enterprise under the Ministry of Petroleum and Natural Gas, Govt. of India. The programme is sector-focused; the preferred sectors for startups are chemicals, logistics, infrastructure, travel, oil field services and packaging.




Post Graduate Programme in Management (PGP)

The Post Graduate Programme is designed to develop professional managers with strong conceptual fundamentals and skills required to manage businesses of the future while giving them the vision to determine what the future will be. This programme is a two-year, full-time, residential programme. The students meeting the programme requirements are awarded the degree - Masters in Business Administration.

The PGP continually challenges the students to be prepared for the future. Courses are redesigned every year with feedback from the industry. New courses are introduced at an impressive rate each year. This helps in incorporating the latest concepts and paradigms into the curriculum even as the world is awakening to the need. The PGP also prepares the students to take up multiple responsibilities and energizes them for the fast-track performance expected of them. The curriculum, by any standards, is rigorous. Assignments, live and simulated projects, periodic evaluations, and demanding academic schedules ensures that the students develop time management skills. It is this quality that makes managers from IIM Lucknow a cut above the rest in challenging situations.


Post Graduate Programme in Agri-Business Management (PGP-ABM)

The two-year Post Graduate Programme in Agribusiness Management is a full-time residential course. It is designed to develop agribusiness leaders, entrepreneurs, and intrapreneurs with vision, competence, and appropriate attitude for promoting/growing agribusiness and agro-based enterprises with a strong international orientation. The students meeting the programme requirements are awarded the degree - Masters in Business Administration - Agri-Business.

The key feature of this course is that a significant number of compulsory foundation courses in the functional areas of management in the first year are blended with agricultural/ rural context-specific courses in the second year. The course is designed to allow students significant field exposure and gives them hands-on experience and action orientation - Global benchmarking and industry partnership.

Placements – PGP & PGP ABM

IIM Lucknow concluded its Final Placements for the Batch of PGP38 and ABM19. 


Post Graduate Programme in Sustainable Management (PGPSM)






International Programme in Management for Executives (IPMX)










Executive Fellow Programme in Management

Consultancy







Management Development Programme

Since its inception in 1984, Indian Institute of Management Lucknow has been a leading authority in quality enhancement among corporate and public systems by influencing leadership and management practices. The creation of Management Development Programme (MDP) department in 1985 is one such initiative. The MDP department has initiated a wide variety of programmes and activities aimed at developing leadership and competitiveness in the industry. Each programme is designed to address the distinct needs of specific executives at various points in their careers, helping them enhance their skill sets and progress in their careers. These courses are designed with the intention of offering industry-integrated up-skilling customised to organisational needs. MDP offers focused training in many areas which would be relevant across bands, roles, and job definitions in any vertical or sector.

These programmes have been meticulously designed to inculcate strong conceptual frameworks in business and management skills to integrate advanced management theories with real-world business practices. At present, MDP is conducting two such programmes, namely the Certificate Programme in General Management for Executives (CPGME) and the Certificate Programme in Business. As part of the corporate social responsibility, IIM Lucknow conducts a six-

month General Management Programme for Defence Officers. The objective of the programme is to facilitate the smooth second career transition of Defence Officers into the corporate world and familiarize them with contemporary management practices. The programmes can be conducted at either of our campuses (Lucknow or Noida) or the location desired by the client organization. This Academic Year 3 courses of Defence General Management were initiated from IIM Lucknow & Noida Campuses.

A diverse portfolio of online blended learning programmes was introduced varying from 6 to 11 months of duration. The programmes are bifurcated into online modules followed by the on-campus immersion towards the end of the programme. Around 50 online programs are partnered with various Edutech partners such as TSW, Miles Education, VC Now, Imarticus, Emeritus, Talent Edge, Talent Sprint, Veranda Learning, etc. Working professionals from the pan-India and global footprint have successfully completed these courses. The programmes are an eclectic blend of domain expertise and simulated applicability that engages the professionals in understanding the focussed nuances of various functional and behavioural aspects critical in management.

Computer Centre

The Computer Centre is housed in a spacious 7500 sq. ft., air-conditioned centrally located designed building and is equipped with state-of-the-art computing resources to cater to the needs of the academics as well as administrative activities of the Institute. The IT infrastructure at IIML Computer Centre includes a fibre optics backbone-based campus-wide network, connecting Computers on heterogeneous platforms with several servers. The network provides accessibility of more than 2000 nodes to each of these servers for sharing different hardware and software resources. The hardware resources of the Institute include Computers (from Core-i5 to Xeon processors, 4 to 48 GB RAM, 512 GB to 2 TB Storage), and high-speed printers. The software resources include a wide variety of managementoriented software and a Microsoft Campus agreement.

All students are provided an email and login account and sufficient storage space on joining the Institute and round-the-clock access to the wired/ wireless network and secure Internet with a high-speed leased line from PowerGrid Corporation Limited and NKN (National Knowledge Network).



Library: The Learning Resource Centre

Operating from a spacious building of about 30,000 square feet, fully air-conditioned, centrally located and functionally designed building with a seating capacity of 250 readers in five halls, the library is operating in a fully automated environment. The library is equipped with ergonomically designed furniture, fittings, and fixtures. Integrated library management software is in place. Entire library resources are bar-coded, and an Online Public Access Catalogue (OPAC) is giving information about its resources. The active collection of the library is tagged with the RFID tags, and the RFID System has been installed for surveillance, issue return and other operations related to AMH (Automated Material Handling) operations. Gyanodaya is the centre of attraction for academics, researchers, and students. The objective of Gyanodaya is "to promote knowledge generation and application through its effective dissemination." The library acts as the main learning resource centre and caters to the information needs of the Institute's teaching, training, research and consultancy programmes. The library has a substantial collection of Databases, CDs/DVDs etc.


Library - NOIDA Campus

LUCKNOW LAUGHTER CLUB





EWC continually organizes various community get-togethers on occasions such as Holi, Diwali, Christmas, New Year.



IIML Lucknow has created an ecosystem and hub for entrepreneurship and innovation with its two Incubators


A. IIML Enterprise Incubation Centre:


IIM Lucknow Enterprise Incubation Centre has been setup by IIM Lucknow at its Noida campus. This is a registered section 8 company (Not for Profit). The centre is supported by NSTEDB, Dept. of Science & Technology, Govt. of India and UP State Govt. under Startup & IT policy.

With a credible track record of successfully mentoring startup companies and individual entrepreneurs, IIML Enterprise Incubation Centre offers a range of Business and Technical Services, Seed Fund Support, State of Art Technology Lab Support, Expert Advisory, Network Support, and Industry Linkages. Currently, IIML EIC hosts over 110+ startups, with a collective valuation of more than INR 2000+ crore, demonstrating its significant contribution to the startup ecosystem and economic development of the nation, creating Atma Nirbhar Bharat. In 2023-24, the EIC onboarded 20+ Startups in the areas of Deeptech, Agritech, Fintech, Ed tech, Social Media, Healthtech & Cyber Security.

B. IIM Lucknow SIDBI Center for Innovations in Financial Inclusion (SCI-FI)

SIDBI Centre for Innovations in Financial Inclusion (SCIFI) was established through an agreement between SIDBI and IIM Lucknow with the aim to nurture start-ups working on financial inclusion aided by technology (FinTech) by providing an enabling environment for growth of ventures. SCIFI seeks to unlock the entrepreneurial potential of the Indian youth through capacity building measures and by mentoring of start-ups in the domain of financial inclusion. IIM Lucknow has launched new innovative courses, some of them include:



We have audited the attached Balance Sheet of the Indian Institute of Management, Lucknow (Institute) as at 31 March, 2024, Income & Expenditure Account and Receipts & Payments Account for the year ended on that date under Section 19(2) of the Comptroller & Auditor General's (Duties, Powers & Conditions of Service) Act, 1971 read with Section 23(3) of the Indian Institutes of Management Act, 2017. These financial statements are the responsibility of the Institute's Management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit.

- 2. This separate Audit Report contains the comments of the Comptroller & Auditor General of India (CAG) on the accounting treatment only with regard to classification, conformity with the best accounting practices, accounting standards and disclosure norms, etc. Audit observations on financial transactions with regard to compliance with the Law, Rules & regulations (Propriety and Regularity) and efficiency-cum-performance aspects, etc., if any are reported through Inspection Reports/CAG's Audit Reports separately.
- 3. We have conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in India. These standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free from material misstatements. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosure in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of financial statements. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinion.
- 4. Based on our audit, we report that:
- (i) We have obtained all the information and explanations, which to the best of our knowledge and belief were necessary for the purpose of our audit;

- (ii) The Balance Sheet, Income & Expenditure Account and Receipts & Payments Account dealt with by this report have been drawn up in the Format of Financial Statements for Central Higher Educational Institutions (format) prescribed by MHRD, Government of India.
- (iii) In our opinion, proper books of accounts and other relevant records have been maintained by the Indian Institute of Management, Lucknow as required under Section 23(1) of Indian Institutes of Management Act, 2017 in so far as it appears from our examination of such books.
- (iv) We further report that:

(A) General

(A.1) The Institute has depicted Rs. 9119.58 lakh as Academic Expenses in the Receipts & Payments Account under the Payments side. However, this included an amount of Rs. 42.00 lakh pertaining to Capital Expenditure. Hence, the Institute needs to rectify this depiction in their Receipts & Payments Account suitably.

SCHEDULE 23 - SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

1. Basis for Preparation of Accounts:

- 1.1 The financial statements are prepared under the historical cost convention on the accrual basis, unless stated otherwise.
- 1.2 The Institute has presented its Financial Statements according to Revised Financial Reporting format, given by MHRD for "Central Higher Educational Institutions".

2. Revenue Recognition:

- 2.1 Misc. Receipts, CAT income, Sale of Admission Forms and Interest on Saving Bank Accounts are accounted on cash basis. Fees from students of various programs including MDP & Consultancy Fee are collected on periodical basis and are accounted on accrual basis.
- 2.2 Income from Land, Buildings and Other Property and Interest on Investments are accounted on accrual basis.
- 2.3 Interest on interest bearing advances to staff for House Building and Computers is accounted on accrual basis every year, though the actual recovery of interest starts after the full repayment of the principal.

3. Fixed Assets & Depreciation:

- 3.1 Fixed Assets are stated at cost of acquisition including inward freight, duties and taxes and incidental and direct expenses related to acquisition, installation and commissioning.
- 3.2 Fixed Assets are classified into Tangible & Intangible Assets in Schedule-4 as advised by CAG.
- 3.3 The depreciation is provided on Straight Line Method (SLM) for all assets purchased since 2017-18 and depreciation is provided on WDV for assets purchased before 2017-18.
- 3.4 Along with the reclassification of assets, amount of accumulated depreciation has also been transferred to the respective block of assets.

4. Intangible Assets:

4.1 E Journals & Computer Software are being treated as Institute's Intangible Assets and shown separately.

5. Stocks:

Expenditure on purchase of Stationary/Printing material & electrical items are accounted for as revenue expenditure after adjustment of value of closing stock held as on 31st March, 2024. The closing stocks is valued at cost.

6. Retirement:

- 6.1 Towards Gratuity of employees, a Group Gratuity Scheme is instituted through LIC (as Fund Manager) by constituting an independent Fund, which manages the gratuity liability and it is in operation since 2001-02.
- 6.2 Towards Earned leave encashment of employees, a Group Leave encashment Scheme is instituted through LIC (as Fund Manager) by constituting an independent Fund, which manages the Earned leave encashment liability of the Institute.
- 6.3 Provision for pension liability as on 31st March, 2016-17 in respect of employees who had joined on or before 31.12.2003 has been assessed by actuarial firm and accordingly Fund was provided in installment of ₹ 20.00 crore every year from 2016-17. 8th Installment of ₹43.00 crores is being added during this year to make the pension liabilities fully funded.
 - Towards Pension liability of employees, a Group Superannuation Scheme Defined Benefit (GSSDB) Policy is instituted through LIC (as Fund Manager) by constituting an independent Fund, which manages the Pension liability of the Institute and it is in operation since 01.02.2024.
- 6.4 As per approved of BoG, NPS is applicable in respect of employees who joined the Institute on or after 01.01.2004.

7. Investments:

7.1 All the Investments are held for long term hence valued at cost. Renewal of the Investments has been done as and when required.

8.1 Earmarked/Endowment Funds:

All the long terms funds are earmarked for specific purposes. Those with large balances also have investments in Term Deposits with Banks/LIC/Govt Securities. The accrual interest income from investments and interest on Savings Bank is credited to the respective Funds. The expenditures are debited to the funds. The assets created out of Earmarked Funds where the ownership vests in the Institution, are merged with the assets of the Institution by crediting an equal amount to the Capital Fund. The balance in the respective funds is carried forward and is represented on the assets side by the balance at Bank, Investment and accrued interest.

8.2 A sub-schedule listing all the Endowments individually with full details is annexed as ANNEXURE - 'A'.

9. Investment of Earmarked Funds and Interest Income Accrued on Such Investments:

To the extent not immediately required for expenditure or amount added at the end of the Financial Year, the amount available against such funds are invested in approved Government Bonds or deposited for fixed term with Banks, leaving the balance in Savings Bank Accounts (wherever applicable).

Interest received, interest accrued & due and interest accrued but not due on such investments are added to the respective funds and not treated as income of the Institution.

10. Sponsored & Consulting Projects:

- 10.1 In respect of ongoing Consulting Projects, the amounts received from sponsors are credited in the group, "Current Liabilities and Provisions" and expenditure incurred/advances paid against such projects, are shown in the group "Loans, Advances & Deposits".
- 10.2 A sub-schedule listing advance received and payments against individual Consultancy and Funded Research Projects is enclosed as **ANNEXURE -'B'**.
- 10.3 In respect of sponsored scholarships, amount received from sponsors are credited to 'Scholarship Others Received' and on its payment, to students, it is debited to 'Scholarship Others Paid' account under PGP Expenditure.

11. Lease-hold Land:

Lease-hold, NOIDA is being amortized for the lease period of 90 years.

12. Income Tax

The income of the Institution is exempt from Income Tax under Section 10(23c) (iv) of the Income Tax Act. No provision for tax is therefore made in the accounts.
