Minutes of the 3<sup>rd</sup>meeting of the Central-Grant-in-Aid Committee for the Centrally Sponsored Scheme for Infrastructure Development Private Aided/Unaided Minority Institutes (Elementary Secondary/Senior Secondary Schools) (IDMI) and Scheme for Providing Quality Education in Madrasas (SPQEM) for the year 2014-15 held on 22.12.2014 at 3.00 p.m. under the Chairmanship of Secretary (School Education & Literacy)(List of participants at <u>Annexure-I)</u>

The thirdmeeting of the Central Grant-in-Aid Committee (GIAC) for the year 2014-15 for considering proposals under the Scheme for Infrastructure Development of Private Aided/Unaided Minority Institutes (Elementary/Secondary/Senior Secondary Schools) (IDMI) and Scheme for Providing Quality Education in Madrasas (SPQEM) was held on 22.12.2014 at 3.00p.m. under the Chairmanship of Secretary, Department of School Education & Literacy. Dr. Nagesh Singh, Economic Adviser, Department of School Education & Literacy and presented the agenda for discussion and consideration of the Central GIAC.

#### Agenda-1: Confirmation of the minutes of the meeting held on 27thAugust, 2014

The Committee confirmed the minutes of the meeting held on 27.08.2014 as no objection was received from any quarter.

# Agenda-2: Action Taken Report (ATR) on the minutes of the meeting held on 27.08.2014 and Budget Provision.

Action taken report was noted by the Committee. The Committee noted that the Budget provision for SPQEM and IDMI for the financial year 2014-15 is Rs. 37500.00 lakh including Rs 3750.00 lakh for NER. It was informed that out of this, an amount of Rs. 817.15 lakh has been released to the State Governments and releases to the tune of 55.64 to Maharashtra and Karnataka (2<sup>nd</sup> installment) are under process under IDMI. Out of the Rs 46 crore (approx.) approved in the GIAC Meeting held on 27<sup>th</sup> August, 2014,grant of Rs 12.75 crore to 6 states is under process.

#### Agenda-3: Proposals for consideration of Central GIAC under SPQEM

The Committee was informed that the Department had received renewal proposals from the States of Uttar Pradesh, Uttarakhand and Bihar and fresh proposals from Maharashtra, Uttar Pradesh and Uttarakhand. The Committee took up the renewal proposals first for consideration.

### (1) Uttar Pradesh

#### (i) 1406 (1446) Madrasas for the year 2014-15

The Committee examined the renewal proposals in respect of 1406 madarsas for theyear2014-15 and approved the same for honorarium of 3025 Graduate and 332 Post Graduate with B.Ed. teachers recommended by the Government of Uttar Pradesh. However it was clarified that salary is being given for upto a maximum of 3 teachers per madrasa only, as that is the scheme norm.

#### (ii) 805 (849) Madrasas for 2014-15

The Committee examined the renewal proposals in respect of 805 madarsas for the year 2014-15 and approved the same for honorarium of 1652 Graduate and 309 Graduate with B.Ed./Post Graduate/ Post Graduate with B.Ed. teachers recommended by the Government of Uttar Pradesh. However it was clarified that salary is being given for uptoa maximum of 3 teachers per madrasaonly, as that is the scheme norm.

(iii) Uttar Pradesh had also sought grants for renewal of 1814 (1891), 2039 (2108) and 438 (456) madrasas. However the Committee deferred releasing grants to these madrasas since only partial UCs had been received from the State Government for these lots.

(iv)In addition, proposals had also been received from Uttar Pradesh for grants for additional teachers of 477 and 101 madrasas who have acquired higher qualification or have been replaced

by the teachers who had lower educational qualifications. However the Committee was of the view that since these additional madrasa teachers are from those madrasas which are being already supported under various madrasa lots, these teachers should be included in those madrasalots, to avoid any duplication. The State must ensure also that the number of teachers in any madrasa does not exceed the maximum limit of three teachers. The Govt. of Uttar Pradesh representative was asked to make the desired corrections, but failed to do till the drafting of these minutes.

The Scheme for Providing Quality Education in Madarsas (SPQEM) provides for honorarium of Rs. 6000/- p.m. to a graduate teacher and Rs. 12000/- to a post graduate teacher or a graduate teacher with B.Ed. States have given proposals where they have indicated salary requirement @ Rs. 6000/- per month for graduate/post graduate teacher. The State Governments were requested to provide a break-up of teachers with graduate, post-graduate or B.Ed. qualification so that the honorarium rates prescribed in the scheme could be provided to the madarsa teachers. However, since a break-up of graduate/post graduate teachers was not available with the State Governments immediately, it was decided by the GIAC to approve honorarium @ Rs. 6000/- per month. The GIAC further decided that the States may provide break-up of teachers with graduate, post graduate, post graduate or graduate with B.Ed. qualification in future renewal proposals so that qualified teachers are not put at a disadvantage.

#### (2) Uttarakhand

#### (i) 74 Madrasas for 2014-15

The Committee examined the renewal proposals in respect of 74 madarsas for the year 2014-15 and approved the same for honorarium of 23\* Graduate and 178\* Graduate with B.Ed./Post Graduate/ Post Graduate with B.Ed. teachers recommended by the Government of Uttarakhand. However it was specified that salary is being given for uptoamaximum of 3 teachers per madrasa. In addition annual grant for library for 69 madrasas @ Rs 5000/ per madrasa and annual grant for science lab for 4 madrasa @ Rs 5000 per madrasa was also approved.

The Committee examined the renewal proposals in respect of 50 madarsas for the year 2014-15 and approved the same for honorarium of 20\* Graduate and 129\* Graduate with B.Ed./Post Graduate/ Post Graduate with B.Ed. teachersrecommended by the Government of Uttarakhand. However it was specified that salary is being given for a maximum of 3 teachers per madrasa. In addition annual Grant for library for 49 madrasas @ Rs 5000/ per madrasa was also approved.

## (3) Bihar

Bihar had sent two renewal proposals for madrasas. However, since there was no representative from the State Govt. of Bihar, the agenda item was deferred by the CGIA Committee.

# **Fresh Proposals**

## (1) Maharashtra

The Committee examined the proposal of 67 madrasas for 41 graduate and 159 post graduate teachers and financial assistance for computer lab, Science/Maths kits, Library books and for Teachers' training which had been recommended by Government of Maharashtra. However, the same was deferred by the CGIA Committee since the representative from Maharashtra informed that on review and personal visits of officers to some madrasas for which grant was being sought, it was found that theywere running only for 2-4 hours and the children in these

madrasas were enrolled and attending regular schools. Since the objective of SPQEM was already being met in that children are receiving a modern education, the CGIAC was of the view that there was no justification in giving grants to these madrasas. Hence this item was deferred.

#### (2) Uttar Pradesh

#### i) 672 madarsas

The Committee examined the fresh proposals in respect of 672 madarsas for the year 2014-15 and approved the same for honorarium of 957\*Graduate and 914\* Graduate with B.Ed./Post Graduate/ Post Graduate with B.Ed. teachers recommended by the Government of Uttar Pradesh (as per the revised proposal submitted by the State Govt.). However it was specified that salary is being given for maximum of 3 teachers per madrasa. In addition,Computer lab for 78 madrasas @ Rs 100000 each, Science and maths kits for 672 madrasas @ Rs 15000 each and Library/book bank for 672 madrasas @ Rs 50000/ per madrasa was also approved.

#### ii) 292 madarsas

The proposal of the state for 238 additional graduate and 75 post graduate teachers appointed in 292 madrasas was not approved since the Committee was informed that these madrasas had been sanctioned grant for teachers. However the Committee was of the view that since these additional madrasa teachers are from those madrasas which are being already supported under various madrasa lots, these teachers should be included in those madrasa lots to avoid any duplication and the State may ensure that the number of teachers supported by the Govt. of India in any madrasa does not exceed three teachers. Hence it was decided that the State may include these teachers in those madrasa lots.

#### (3) Uttarakhand

#### i) 26 Madarsas for the year 2014-15

The Committee examined the fresh proposals in respect of 26 and 8 madarsas for the year 2014-15. Since the proposals were not in the prescribed format of the scheme, the Committee deferred these proposals and directed the State Government to submit the proposals in the proper format of the scheme.

Agenda 4 The Committee was informed that NIOS had revised the Admission and Examination fee for Muslim Minority students enrolled under SPQEM scheme. The same was noted by the Committee as per the table given below. NIOS was also requested to give a list of children enrolled in SPQEM who had been given certificates by NIOS.

The GIAC also decided that all the madarsas supported under SPQEM would have to upload their data on U-DISE Portal and this would be condition for renewal of grants.

# Agenda 5 Infrastructure Development Private Aided/Unaided Minority Institutes (Elementary Secondary/Sr Secondary Schools) (IDMI)

TheCommittee was informed that fresh proposals had been received from Maharashtra, Karnataka, Uttar Pradesh and Sikkim. Proposals had been received from Arunachal Pradesh and Mizoram and were placed in the 1<sup>st</sup> CGIAC held on 27.8.2014 but not approved.

#### i) Arunachal Pradesh (2 proposals)

The State Govt. had forwarded two proposals under IDMI scheme for financial assistance for infrastructure development which were placed in the previous meeting of Central GIAC but could not be approved since there was no representative from the State Government. Now the

State Govt. had forwarded Minority Certificates (received from the district authority) for these two proposals. None of the proposals was approved as there are 10 KGBVs which are residential upper primary schools for girls in East Siang for which a hostel had been requested under IDMI.

### (ii) Mizoram (31 proposals)

The Committee was informed that 31 proposals had been received from the Govt. of Mizoram. The representative of State Government of Mizoram also gave information on the schools for which grants had been sanctioned in the last few years and the progress made by these schools. The Committee appreciated the progress shown by Mizoram in utilizing IDMI grants to strengthen school infrastructure. GIAC alsoapproved the following proposals:
